Ultrnationalist Mobilisation and Pathways to Radicalisation

In recent years, there has been a resurgence of ultra-nationalist mass (re-)mobilisation in Turkey. New ultra-nationalist groups mobilised since 2016, conservative nationalist organisations established in the mid-2000s have recently turned to violence, and older nationalist paramilitary groups have re-mobilised. These groups employ a blend of ultra-nationalist and Islamist narratives, attract large masses and sometimes resort to violence. This project will examine how and the extent to which the ultra-nationalist groups lead to violent extremism by analysing the extremist propaganda produced, discourse and narratives used, mobilisation tactics employed and the role these groups play within their constituencies. Drawing on 55 interviews, one focus group and directed content analysis of social media accounts, this project aims to understand whether this recent ultra-nationalist mass mobilisation is a threat to further violent radicalisation in Turkey and a pathway for Islamist radicalisation. Research findings will also contribute to the efforts to prevent or counter radicalisation.

In recent years, there has been a resurgence of ultra-nationalist mass (re-)mobilisation in Turkey. New ultra-nationalist groups mobilised following the failed coup attempt in 2016. Conservative nationalist organisations established in the mid-2000s have recently turned to violence. At the same time, older nationalist paramilitary groups that had been demobilised in the 2000s have now remobilised.

These organisations employ a blend of pro-government ultra-nationalist and Islamist narratives, attract large masses and sometimes resort to violence. They have attacked the main opposition Republican People's Party's and pro-Kurdish Peoples' Democratic Party's buildings and threatened journalists and politicians. At the same time, they adopt a religious Islamist discourse, reacting against those who conflict with conservative religious way of life. For instance, they harass alcohol consumers and regularly threaten and attack members of the LGBTQ community.

The overall objective of this project is to explore whether this ultra-nationalist mass (re-)mobilisation is a threat to further violent radicalisation in Turkey. Given that there seems to be growing public empathy for jihadism and increased numbers of fighters recruited by ISIS and Al-Qaeda in Turkey (Yayla, 2019), this project also aims to understand whether this ultra-nationalist mobilisation in Turkey is a pathway for Islamist radicalisation. The final objective of this project is to explore the ways to prevent or counter this radicalisation.

More specifically, this project will examine how and the extent to which the ultra-nationalist groups lead to violent extremism in Turkey. To that end, we will analyse the extremist propaganda produced by these groups, discourse and narratives used, how these groups mobilise their constituencies and what role these groups play within the constituencies they are meant to represent. We will also explore what, if any, differences there are between different groups. Therefore, the following groups are selected for this project: older ultra-nationalist paramilitary groups (Grey Wolves, Alperen Hearths), conservative nationalist organisations established in the mid-2000s (Ottoman Hearths, AK Hearths), and new ultra-nationalist groups (National Mobilisation Movement Platform).

METHODOLOGY

The project will last for 12 months and the primary data will rely on face-to-face interviews with 15 local/district leaders of ultra-nationalist groups, 30 of their members, 10 stakeholders; one focus group with the members and directed content analysis of social media accounts. Different ways of data collection will ensure the accuracy and integrity of the data collected.

1. The project will start with a kick-off/capacity building workshop with approximately 15 relevant actors, including representatives of national, European and international organisations, donors working on Turkish civil society, policy analysts, public officials, and civil society representatives. There is often little interaction and capacity building among these actors, although they may work in close collaboration with civic actors. Most actors operate from Istanbul and a few from Ankara. We will invite three participants from Ankara. Their costs will be covered from the project's budget. We will introduce the research and buy-in their support for the project. We will discuss the context, how civic actors can become conduits for radicalisation and how they can moderate radicalisation. This workshop will be important for scoping and mapping ultra-nationalist mass mobilisation in Turkey, in particular within civil society.

2. There will be a second workshop in month 5 on ultra-nationalist mobilisation and paramilitary groups, efforts to prevent or counter radicalisation and de-radicalisation programs in different countries with examples from Latin America and the Middle East. We will invite approximately 30 people including the participants of the first workshop and academics working in this area. The workshop will also include discussion on the history of ultra-nationalist mobilisation and its changing nature in Turkey. The project team will organise and convene the workshop. PI Zihnioglu has extensive research experience on Turkish civil society including conservative actors, Co-I Yesevi on Turkish nationalism, and Co-I Thomson on paramilitary groups. Following the workshop, the project team will make a midterm assessment of the project and discuss ideas for furthering the research.

3. PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi will examine the selected groups' social media accounts. They will collect data on a weekly basis and focus on calls for and reactions to mass mobilisation, material promoting extremist propaganda and explore the constitutive content of the narrative used in written and audio-visual elements (including retweeted materials) such as ideology, culture, myths, religion and other aspects. They will analyse the data qualitatively by directed content analysis based on themes determined prior research and literature relating to radicalisation and extremist propaganda.

4. Semi-structured interviews: PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi will interview approximately 15 local/district leaders of the selected groups, 30 of their members, and 10 different actors (political party members, government and public officials, civil society actors). The interviews with the local/district leaders will explore the narratives and discourse including its constitutive content such as the use of ideology, culture, myths, religion and other aspects, mobilisation strategies employed including the use of material and emotional incentives. The interviews with members of these groups will explore what role the groups play within the constituencies they are meant to serve, whether the groups provide a free space for radical thought and action, how they interpret and consume the extremist propaganda, their reactions to violent

action conducted by some members of their group or other groups, and perceptions of law enforcement.

5. Focus group meeting: The interviews will be followed by a focus group with 10 people, who are members of selected ultra-nationalist groups. PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi will conduct the focus group. The focus group will give us the opportunity to further explore the questions raised in the interviews and make comparisons between different groups studied in this research.

6. Learning exchange/dissemination workshop: After we complete the data analysis, we will organise a workshop to share the findings of our research with different actors. We will unpack causes and the mechanism of radicalisation. Research findings will contribute to efforts to prevent and counter violent radicalisation and better understand Islamic radicalisation. This workshop will also facilitate cross-sectoral engagement amongst political, public and civic actors.

One research assistant will be hired, who will help in collecting social media data, organising the workshops and the focus group, and will conduct some of the interviews.

ORIGINALITY AND CONTRIBUTION

This research is timely and important in three ways. First, this study on specific groups in Turkey provides scope for comparison to other cases and the formulation of policy implications. Ultra-nationalist groups operating within civil society have been gaining traction in several countries over the past decade, such as Ukraine (National Squads), Thailand (Social Sanction), India (Cow Protection Forum). While some earlier attention has been given to “uncivil society” (Kopecky and Mudde, 2003; Youngs, 2017), these civic organisations that employ violent tactics are under-studied. This research contributes to the existing literature on ultra-nationalist groups and violent radicalisation by investigating the recent mobilisations in Turkey and whether this can lead to Islamist radicalisation.

Second, by studying group dynamics, narratives and discourses, and propaganda of ultra-nationalist groups in Turkey, this research will improve our understanding of the causes and processes of radicalisation. Radicalisation is an ambiguous concept (Sedgwick, 2010). This research operationalises radicalisation as advocating, engaging in and supporting illegal and violent political action to further stated objectives. While there is no commonly accepted pathway to radicalisation, research suggests the consumption of extremist propaganda as a major cause for radicalisation (Vergani et al., 2018). The use of culture (Hamm, 2009) and myths (Githens-Mazer, 2009) are important elements. Group dynamics are also important because radicalisation takes place in a social setting (Vergani et al., 2018). Different studies (Ingram, 2015, Bartlett and Miller, 2012) show how group-level dynamics matter—how immediate social interactions shape sentiment—in extremist propaganda. In relation to group dynamics, a study on the state of research carried out for the EU’s Radicalisation Awareness Network (Pisoui and Ahmed, 2016) underlines the emergent acknowledgement that people are not mere victims of their environment, but agents with their own ideas and objectives. This research will provide further insights into the causes and processes of radicalisation.

Third, recent studies on conservative non-state actors in Turkey have mainly provided broad mappings (Sunar, 2018) or focused on the governing AK Party’s social and economic policy (Bilgili and Kraetzschmar, 2018). The ultra-nationalist mass (re-)mobilisation, however, has been largely overlooked. Turkey is no stranger to violent ultra-nationalist mass mobilisation. During the 1970s, violent clashes between the ultra-nationalist paramilitary groups and leftist factions were common. Therefore, the re-mobilisation of some of these ultra-nationalist paramilitaries and the building up of ultra-nationalist mobilisation make this research highly important. It is also timely to ask whether current ultra-nationalist mobilisation in Turkey is a pathway to Islamist radicalisation.

There is a need for well-designed policies to prevent and counter radicalisation, in particular those arising

from within civil society. This requires a thorough understanding of dynamics of radicalisation within civic actors, what role they play within the constituencies and within civil society. This research addresses this gap by exploring the mobilisation strategies, narratives and discourses as well as other tools and incentives employed by these groups for mobilisation by drawing on a set of interviews, a focus group, and analysing social media accounts.

Months 1–2 (May–June 2020) – The project team will complete the ethical reviews from their respective institutions, plan the kick-off/capacity building workshop, draft literature review and select themes for the social media content analysis.

Month 3 (July 2020) – Kick-off/capacity building workshop: This workshop will gather approximately 15 relevant actors for scoping and mapping ultra-nationalist mass mobilisation in Turkey, and in particular within civil society. Several organisations, networks, donors at the national, European and international levels support the development of Turkish civil society and investigate its changing dynamics. There is often little interaction and capacity building among these actors, although they may work in close collaboration with civic actors. This workshop will bring together these various actors, introduce the research and buy-in their support for the project. PI Zihnioglu has been working on and with civil society actors in Turkey for almost 15 years and has a strong network with civic actors and donor community in Turkey. Co-I Yesevi has been working on Turkish nationalism for over 10 years and has a strong network with the nationalist parties and think tanks. Their network will be able to mobilise different actors to participate in the workshop.

Months 3–7 (July–November 2020) – Data collection: We will collect data in three ways: interviews, focus group, social media content analysis. First, a total of approximately 55 interviews will be conducted (15 local/district leaders of the selected groups, 30 of their members, and 10 different actors such as political party members, government and public officials, civil society actors). Interviews will be conducted by PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi and some interviews will be conducted by the research assistant under Co-I Yesevi's guidance. PI Zihnioglu has established links with these groups while conducting previous research on Islamic/conservative civil society. Co-I Yesevi has a strong network with the nationalist parties. Their network and previous research experience will ensure access to these groups and research participants. The research assistant will hold a Ph.D. in social sciences and have research experience in a relevant field. S/he will work 8 hours a week for 20 weeks (July–November). Second, a focus group meeting will be held on month 7 (November) with 10 people, who are members of different selected ultra-nationalist groups. Focus group meeting will be conducted by PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi and the research assistant will provide support in logistical matters. Third, we will examine the selected groups' social media accounts to collect written and audio-visual elements according to the themes determined during the first two months of the project. PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi will collect data from the social media accounts with the help of the research assistant.

Month 5 (September 2020) – Workshop: PI Zihnioglu and Co-I's Yesevi and Thomson will organise a one-day

workshop with the participants of the kick-off/capacity building workshop. Academics and post-graduate researchers working in the area will also be invited and there will be approximately 30 participants. The workshop will be in Turkish and the session led by Co-I Thomson will be translated to Turkish. The research assistant will help the project team schedule and organise the workshop.

Months 8-10 (December–February 2021) – Data Analysis: The interviews and focus group meeting will be transcribed and translated into English and the project team will analyse them thematically. PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi will analyse the data collected from the social media accounts qualitatively by directed content analysis based on the themes selected in the first two months of the workshop.

Months 11-12 (March–April 2021) – Dissemination: Project findings will be disseminated to peers and communicated to a wider audience in different ways. First, we will organise a one-day learning exchange/dissemination workshop (approximately 40 participants) to share the findings of our research. Second, the project team will draft a policy brief on the measures to prevent and counter radicalisation. The brief will be shared with the participants of previous workshops and learning exchange/dissemination workshop. Third, the project team will draft research outputs (see Planned Research Outputs for details) during the final two months of the project.

We are confident that this schedule is realistic and the objectives of this project can be achieved within the proposed timeline. The team will have fortnightly Skype meetings to monitor the progress.

The research impact will be maximised by producing a set of academic and non-academic outputs. The academic outputs will include two peer-reviewed international journal articles and one conference paper. The interviews and focus group meeting will also produce a data set (subject to consent). Data will be anonymised, translated and archived in accordance with the GDPR.

In order to contribute to broader scholarly and policy debates on radicalisation, the project team will produce one short article, which will be submitted to Carnegie Endowment for International Peace for online publication.

Beyond these, it is important that the dissemination of the project results target the policy-makers and public officials. To achieve this, first, we will write a policy brief, which will include a contextual strategy for preventing and countering radicalisation and violent extremism in Turkey. We will identify factors and challenges that need to be considered, suggest ways of incorporating these factors into the strategy, and finally differentiate between the measures that should be taken at the local level and those that are the responsibility of the policy-makers at the national level. This will be shared with all participants that attended the workshops. Second, we will prepare workshop reports, which will also feed into the policy brief. Third, this project will strengthen cross-sectoral engagement amongst political, public and civic actors. Such capacity will be important for producing measures for preventing and countering violent extremism in Turkey.

Plans for Publication and Dissemination

1. Journal articles: Two academic articles will be produced. The first one will focus on the theoretical gap and issues between civic activism and radicalism and submitted to Social Movement Studies. The second one will be on extremist propaganda and violent radicalisation and submitted to Third World Quarterly. The drafting of the papers will be completed within the project's time-frame. Funding for open access will be obtained from the University of Liverpool. This will increase the accessibility of the research findings and also increase visibility.
2. Conference Paper: We will present one paper at the Political Studies Association Annual International Conference in April 2021. The costs of attending this conference will be covered by staff allowance.
3. Short Article: PI Zihnioglu is a member of Carnegie Endowment's Civic Research Network and she regularly publishes short articles on Carnegie's website and contributes to printed publications. The project team will draft a short article based on research findings and submit it for publishing on Carnegie Endowment's website. These publications are useful tools for academics to communicate their work to a wider audience including broader scientific circles, think-tankers, journalists and policy-makers. In addition, research outputs will be shared with members of the Civic Research Network who are scholars and practitioners working on civil society from 10 different countries across the world.
4. Research findings will be disseminated to the non-academic audience through learning exchange/dissemination workshop with stakeholders. The project team will draft a policy brief on the measures to prevent and counter radicalisation. The brief will be shared with the participants of previous workshops and learning exchange/dissemination workshop. The project team will also draft workshop reports and share them with the participants. PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi have strong contacts with local and national actors in Turkey. PI Zihnioglu has conducted several projects on Turkish civil society and has a strong network among Turkish civil society actors and relevant public bodies. Co-I Yesevi has been working on Turkish nationalism and has connections at the nationalist parties. These networks will be useful to disseminate research findings to broader audience and create an impact.
5. The project team will utilise their existing national and international networks to further disseminate the research outputs. PI Zihnioglu is the Management Committee member of European Cooperation in Science and Technology Action titled "Reappraising Intellectual Debates on Civic Rights and Democracy in Europe". This is an interdisciplinary Action which brings together political scientists, historians, and philosophers from all around Europe working on civic rights and democracy. Dissemination of research outputs to this Action will provide an interdisciplinary outreach. Co-I Thomson is a on the Governing Council of the Conflict Research Society, through which he will disseminate research outputs to scholars from different disciplines broadly interested in radicalisation. Finally, although the project team has a strong network in Turkey, we will need the support of the British International Research Institute in Ankara to disseminate the research findings to a wider audience. We will invite them to the learning exchange/dissemination workshop.

The recorders will also be encrypted. Automatic backups of the data will be made to reduce the risk of data loss. Data security will be maintained by having research material accessible only to the research team. All hardware used for access to research material will be protected by passwords. The interviews and recordings will be seen by a transcriber and a translator but confidentiality agreement will be in place with them. The project team will complete a data management plan before we start to conduct the interviews. Data management plan will make sure that data is collected and stored correctly and safely. Following UK Data Protection Act and GDPR, a Data Protection Officer is appointed at the University of Liverpool. Data Protection Officer's contact details will be made available to all subjects taking part in this research.

PI Zihnioglu and Co-I Yesevi will provide support and mentorship to the research assistant in ethical data collection and storage. They will also conduct periodic cross-checks such as compliance with data management protocols or whether interview transcripts and the coding processes ensure quality.

Primary qualitative data will be translated, transcribed, and anonymised by Turkish transcribers, and a copy of the anonymised data will be deposited in the University of Liverpool's institutional data repository. All archived data on the institutional repository will be linked to peer-reviewed publications arising from this project.

This will be timely research as ultra-nationalist mass mobilisation has recently been building up in Turkey. Exploring the relation between this mobilisation and violent radicalisation, and whether it is a pathway for Islamic radicalisation is important given the ongoing Islamic radicalisation in the region continues to be a threat not only in Turkey but also for European countries. In addition, ultranationalist groups are on the rise in several countries across the world. Some of these groups also resort to violence to achieve their objectives. Several national organisations (including the UK's Department for International Development) as well as the European Union explore, discuss and evaluate different ways to prevent and counter violent extremism. The research findings will be relevant for these efforts as well.

This is a collaborative project that draws on the distinct research expertise of three scholars: PI Zihnioglu on civil society and social movements, Co-I Yesevi on nationalism and Co-I Thomson on pro-government paramilitary groups. The project team's diverse research expertise will contribute to the success of the research. At the same time, this collaboration will provide the members of the project team with a unique experience to learn from one another and complement their understanding of the problem.

We request £3310 for Travel Costs:

£1740 for flights of PI Zihnioglu: She will make four visits to Istanbul (£420 for each visit) and one visit to Ankara while in Turkey (domestic flight, £60). The four events are kick-off/capacity building workshop, the second workshop, focus group meeting and learning exchange/dissemination meeting. The first, third and fourth visit will last two days. The second visit (workshop) will be 12 days because she will do some interviews in Istanbul and in Ankara. We request £360 for 18 days of subsistence for the PI's four visits (£20 per day). We request £420 for flight costs of Co-I Thomson. He will make one visit to Istanbul for the workshop. We request £40 of subsistence for his two day stay (£20 per day). We request £120 airport transfer cost for the PI's 4 visits to Turkey (including the transfer between Liverpool and Manchester Airport and domestic airport transfer costs in Istanbul and Ankara), Co-I Thomson's one visit to Turkey. We request £540 for flights of three workshop participants from Ankara. Three participants will come from Ankara to Istanbul three times (domestic flight, £60). We also request £90 for their airport transfer (£10 per each transfer of each participant).
